A fabulously busy and engaging week here at Duncombe! Our Year 1 pupils enjoyed a scientific studies morning exploring Light and Dark with Set Point. The pupils were fully engaged, taking part in experiments and adding to their already growing knowledge of the world around them as discovered and understood by scientific enquiry. But it did not stop there, oh no! On Wednesday Year 3 were transported back to the Roman era with a day dedicated to Roman Britain. Soldiers marched, battle cries were heard and the more mundane cooking and heating of the house were discovered too! Year 6 ventured to a Buddhist Monastery meeting with practicing Buddhists and exploring the beliefs and actions associated with the faith. Three wonderful experiences for our pupils that have taken their learning to the next level.

Class 2LA delivered their class assembly on Friday. Whilst I was absent joining the Year 6 on their travels, I was delighted to be told that the pupils shared their learning experiences from this term with growing confidence and significant comic timing. I read a very interesting article from the Childrens' Poet Laureate, Chris Riddell this week. He is urging school leaders and ministers to halt and reverse the demise of school libraries. I have put the link to the article below. As I read this I was struck with the wonderful gem that is our Library here at Duncombe. Stocked with over 5,600 books and visited by every pupil at least once a week who, to date, have borrowed over 700 titles! Our school library not only sits at the heart of the building but is at the heart of our children's learning experience. Our Year 6 Library Prefects (shown below) spoke with Miss Sands this week about the role and their enjoyment of it.

Vehicle Access Safety Improvements

We are continually looking at ways to improve safety across the site. Following two incidences of near misses at the school entrance where cars have been leaving the site at excessive speeds, we will be installing speed humps across the main entrance to the school and across the entrance to the Parents' Car Park.

These speed humps will not only slow traffic down, but will also provide a visible reminder about speed. They will be the heavy duty PVC type that are black and yellow which also have built in cats eyes for additional visibility in the dark. They are designed to slow traffic to 5 mph.

The speed humps have been ordered and once they arrive on site I shall arrange for them to be fitted by a contractor at the earliest opportunity.

As you will fully appreciate, the safety of you and your children is paramount. I would ask for your cooperation and assistance in ensuring that if entering and exiting the site in your car, you do so safely, at an appropriate speed and being mindful of pedestrians and other road users at all times.

James Storey motivates Upper School

Last Wednesday Upper School were lucky enough to have an assembly led by James Storey. James spoke about how attitude can affect you on and off the sports field. James has had many years to reflect on his own attitude having played professional Rugby from the tender age of 17. James explained that when he first started it really was a challenge to work in such a demanding and high pressured environment. James spoke engagingly and with good humour to the pupils about the challenges that are presented as an elite sportsman and made comparisons to similar challenges that one might find within a school environment, such as in the playground or on a sports fixture.

After discussing in depth about our own individual attitudes, James began to discuss how your individual attitude can positively or negatively affect your peers or a sports team. James used the example of a Wolfpack to explain how attitude can develop cohesion, *"in a pack of wolves the individual wolf is weak, however, several wolves who work together can achieve great success and can take down any animal."* To be one wolf in a wolf pack James said he teaches children to remember the word 'TREDS' which stands for: Teamwork, Respect, Enjoyment, Discipline and Sportmanship.

After finishing some thought provoking Q&A with the pupils, James went on to tell everyone about something he has learnt over his career in rugby, James stated, *"There are two people in this world: 'red loopers' and 'blue loopers'. Red loopers are people that argue and never agree with anyone. These people always think they are right and never wrong. They get frustrated and angry when things do not go their way. They frequently blame others for things out of their control. I have played and known some red loopers on and off the rugby pitch. Those people, in the end, find it hard to succeed and they go around and around, again and again, in a negative red loop. Blue loopers on the other hand are people who give compliments and praise to others. They congratulate others, even when it is at their own expense. Blue loopers are helpful to others. They go around and around, again and again, in a positive blue loop. The red loop characters produce a negative environment, the blue loop characters produce a positive environment. It is easy to be a red looper and I think everyone can be a red looper sometimes, but it takes patience, commitment and self-reflection to become a true blue looper."*
