Bethany Wins the U11 IAPS Clay Pigeon Shoot

Following on from the article in last week's Newsletter we are delighted to share the news that Bethany N (6S) won the U11 IAPS Clay Pigeon Shooting competition! Here is the official press release:

Hertford School Girl hits the target at her first competition.

School Girl is Top Gun at her first competition

Hertford school girl, Bethany Norton (11), took to the stand at the historical West London Shooting School on 4th May, as a team of one, to compete in the IAPS Clay Pigeon Tournament.

Having held a shotgun for the first time only 2 months before, her target was simply to 'not come last'. After a morning of shooting across five clay disciplines, she was delighted to be awarded under 11s female champion, and amazed to learn her score was higher that the champion in the age category above, as well as beating "many of the boys".

"After watching shooting at the Olympic and Commonwealth games I noticed it was a sport that England does well at, I also noticed we had few female competitors. So I thought why not give it a go. After a couple of taster sessions at Lee Valley Shooting Ground with Ken Rist, I was hooked. I hit the first few clays and loved it."

"There is a lot more to think about that you might think, and the language is a bit confusing, eye dominance, Teal, Bateaux, Crossing Birds etc, but it is a great feeling to smash a clay that's quickly disappearing away from you, between the trees."

The competition venue is the oldest shooting club in the world, and Madonna's home club. "I have to admit I was a little nervous watching the schools arrive in larger squads with their instructors and kit – compared to me and my dad. But the organisers were very kind and the marshalls at each stand were very supportive, so as soon as I walked into the first stand I felt confident."

"Clubs all over the UK are trying to encourage girls to try shooting, and we have a few local female shooters that could represent the country in the future, so I know I have to improve – which means a lot more practice, some coaching and eventually some specialist equipment.

I'm grateful to Duncombe School for taking a chance on me and putting me forward, and for IAPS for encouraging girls to take part in what is traditionally a boys' sport."

Happy Puzzle Company Day

The children from Reception to Year 6 were all very excited to experience the new challenges brought by the Happy Puzzle Company this year. The first challenge for some of the children was to balance penguins on a very wobbly ship. The hall rang with shrieks of laughter whenever their penguins toppled off into the sea, and then was full of busy chatter as they talked together about how to solve the various shape and colour challenges that followed. Each workshop was age and ability appropriate, so all the children found something that challenged them. Whilst being a lot of fun, each activity challenged the children's logical thinking and problem-solving skills, their team skills, their communication skills and their ability to persevere when things got tough! By solving problems and conquering challenges that at first seemed too difficult, the children started to see that, together, they can achieve goals which previously may have seemed too hard for them. At the end of each puzzle workshop the children were asked what they felt they had learned. They answered 'to keep trying!' and 'to work as a team and help each other!' They can apply these skills both inside and outside the classroom in future. Well done to everyone who took part and had a go!




Music Tuition:

Latin Challenge Day for Lower School

On Wednesday, the whole of Lower School will be participating in a Latin Challenge Day, where they will be introduced to the wonders of this ancient language, as well as to the history and culture of the Romans. Year 5 pupils are excited to perform a play they have been practising in Latin Club and they will also be assisting me with teaching Lower School some songs in Latin. This will be followed by an interactive session to learn the Latin names for some popular animals.

Traditional Roman games, which foster logic and reasoning skills, will be enjoyed by children in their year groups. We will also be learning all about Roman Numerals as a Maths focus. Lower School pupils will then be invited to follow a Roman Numeral Treasure Hunt with their class teacher around the school site and crack the Latin code!

The day will culminate in a mock Roman dig, where Lower School pupils will be introduced to some key archaeological skills. As real-life History Detectives, pupils will be tasked with discovering Roman artefacts in our 'excavation site', identifying their purpose and finding their Latin names.
